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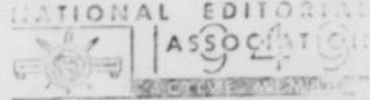
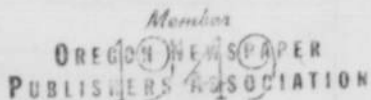

The Haywire Historian

Benjamin Franklin, one of the fastest tramp printers who ever struck Philadelphia, was this country's first wisecracker. Many of his sage witticisms, such as "Keep thy shop and thy shop will keep thee guessing," and "A bird in the hand is O. K. if not squeezed," are still quoted. Franklin was a good printer, fairly fast on

straight matter, but no good on display. At one time, while thin-spacing in Boston, he met up with "Doc" Bixby, "Kokomo" Phillips and Maurice (now "Col.") Church. On account of Franklin's verdant appearance, these pundits nicknamed him "Goofy" and found him useful in rushing the growler. The rugged days of apprenticeship proved helpful to Franklin in later years when he went to France to panhandle money for the struggling colonies. Franklin originated the querulous phrase, later grossly garbled, "Lafayette, where the hell are you?" while rooming in a boarding house where the put out the lights at 8 p.m. He was a great hand to be messin' around with experiments, and invented eyeglasses, electricity, the hit-an-run play and bananas. One of his smartest remarks was, "A fool and his money are soon at the dog races." He had a frank, open countenance, closely resembling that of a sheep-herder which he used to advantage while holding three of a kind. Although Franklin started out as a poor boy, at his death he was very wealthy, having quit the newspaper business while he still had all of his teeth and intellectual faculties.
