The Oregon Medical Society reported this week that a new method of treating common acne with dry ice clears up lesions of the disease with little or no scarring according to a report of two Philadelphia doctors.

More than 2,000 acne patients have been treated by the method with good results. Drs. Carroll S. Wright and E. R. Gross say in a current (June) issue of Archives of Dermatology and Syphilology published by the American Medical Association.

Small pieces of dry ice are applied directly to the acne pustules for from three to five seconds, they explain.

If the lesions are numerous, a large piece may be applied over a group of lesions. Since the lesions are usually elevated, the skin between them is untouched if the right amount of pressure is applied.

'Within a few hours there may be surface vesiculation (blistering) over the pustule; this is followed by drying and general shrinkage of the treated pustules which usually will result in their involution in from one or two treatments with little or no scarring,' the doctors write.

'Deep cystic lesions may require a number of treatments, the number depending on their depth.'

A deep freeze box is being installed at the new grade school this week. Walter Olson, contractor and builder, and M. E. Holgate, refrigeration, are doing the work. Both are from Salem. The deep freeze is 6 X 8 feet. It has six inch sawdust insulation in the outside walls and four inches of glass board on inner walls. It is celled and finished with 1/2 inch plywood, water-proofed and varnished. Equipment used for cooling is 3/4 h. p. universal, heavy duty equipment. Electricity is all ready to operate the deep freeze as soon as it is installed. A special room building was added for this and the wiring is placed under the floor for the safety of school children. It will be a great help to the cafeteria which furnishes school lunches.

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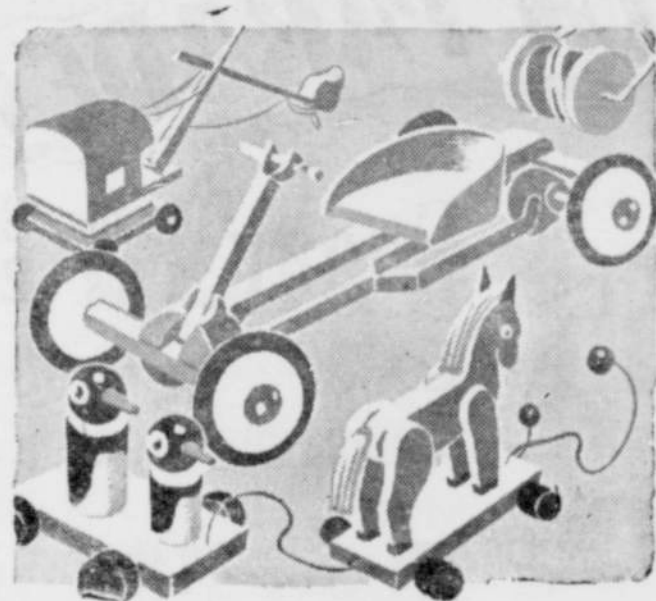
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
