The Columbia County tract has 16 bosses, members of the county farm forestry committee. Their problem in the first annual harvest, 1949, was to plan the cutting rate.

The foresters agreed that the 10 acres were too jampacked with trees for good growth. They saw an average of 100 cords per acre in the existing trees. Then they decided on a yearly cut of ten cords per acre, or a total of 50 cords per acre for five years.

The timber cut in 1949 was from dense patches; from deformed, broken and otherwise damaged trees,
