TIMBER OFFER UPPED

County Judge Grant Murphy said Thursday that J. K. Elder, Portland lumberman, who several months ago had made an offer of \$135,000 to the county for timber on two sections of land above Detroit has now raised his ante offer to \$165,000. Some weeks ago he had upped the \$135,000 offer to \$150,000.

Elder said he was willing to go through with his offer if notified any time up to October 8. The judge said he will not make such notification.

Judge Murphy says it is his understanding the forestry department places a tentative valuation of \$200,000 on the timber.

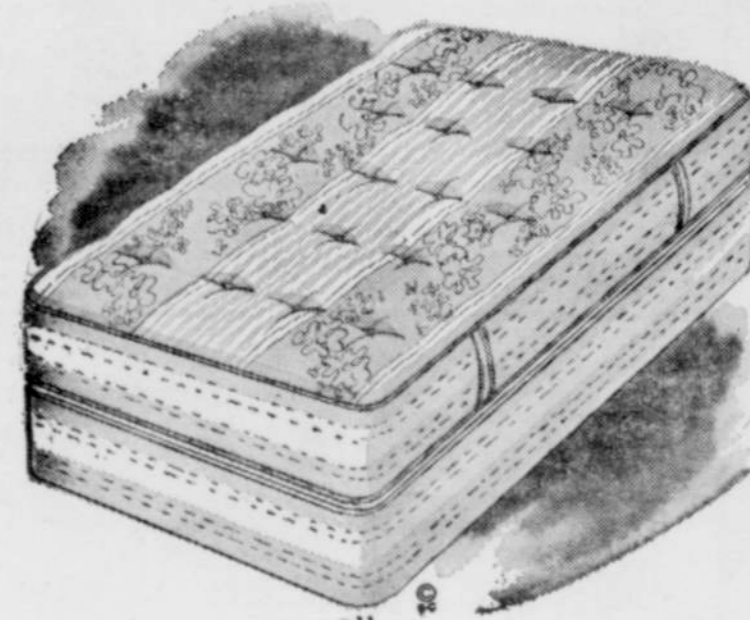
