

DEER HUNTERS SLOW TO REPORT

Deer hunters' report card returns are lagging behind last year, it was announced this week by the Oregon State Game Commission. Almost 2000 cards have been mailed into the Portland office of the Commission, but more than three times that many had been returned after the first week of the 1948 season. All hunters who purchase a deer tag are required to send in the completed return card. This must be done whether a kill is made or not and whether the tag buyer hunts or not.

Early ceturns always run high in kills as those hunters not having made a ill usually wait until the close of the season before reporting. To date out of 2,965 returns 2,938 have been reports of kills. Lae, Deschutes, Klamath, and Tillamook Counties lead the list of kills at this time.




