Hearings were taken by Arthur Kellogg, naturalization examiner from Portland.

Unemployment On Increase Here

A noticeable rise in unemployment in Marion County from an estimated 3750 at the close of October to an estimated 5000 at the close of November was brought about largely by layoffs in the canning industry, William H. Baillie, district Oregon State Employment Service manager, reported.

Plus the cannery workers, however, was a sizeable group of sales and service workers, and some employees of other industries. Unemployment insurance claims filed through the Salem office rose sharply from 1738 at the beginning of the month to 2771 at the close. A total of 489 workers were referred to jobs during November as compared to 543 during the preceding month.

What has developed during the last 60 to 90 days has made available many well qualified men who have not been idle for many months. This condition is called to the attention of employers, home owners and others so that advantage may be taken of this opportunity to secure skilled men for such temporary or repair jobs that have been postponed because good men were scarce, Mr. Baillie said. A total of 175 carpenters, 25 electricians, 35 painters, 10 plumbers and many other skilled and semi-skilled men were available for full or part-time work as the month closed.

It is expected that except for a flurry of demand in retail trades for sales and service people to meet the holiday market in December a further rise in unemployment is ahead. No abrupt change is anticipated, however, until adverse weather drives logging crews out of the woods and makes construction work difficult. A 50 per cent increase in unemployment from the 5000 now estimated for the two counties is not impossible. Farm demand will start again about the first of March which will mark the beginning of general seasonal demand for all industries.

Agriculture in the Polk - Marion area entered the season of lowest labor demand during November. Except for the pulling of root crops and the late harvest of nuts and vegetables the work of 1949 has been pretty well completed. Plowing and planting for next year was continued after starting earlier in the fall. Activity in the construction industry held up well during the month. Anticipated slowdowns did not materialize due largely to favorable weather. Road, highway, bridge, dam and city street and sewer work continued during the month and assisted the building industry in keeping qualified construction workers busy. While the 1948 figures may not be reached in building construction, it should be noted that permits for dwellings will be materially higher this year than last.

Employment in the logging and lumbering industries held up unexpectedly during November with very little let-down from the season's high. Good weather and favorable market conditions have contributed to a generally optimistic outlook in these industries.

Improvements of the area, with addition of several summer homes, and summer and winter recreational facilities provided by the Elkhorn area warrant better road conditions over the hump, it was reported.

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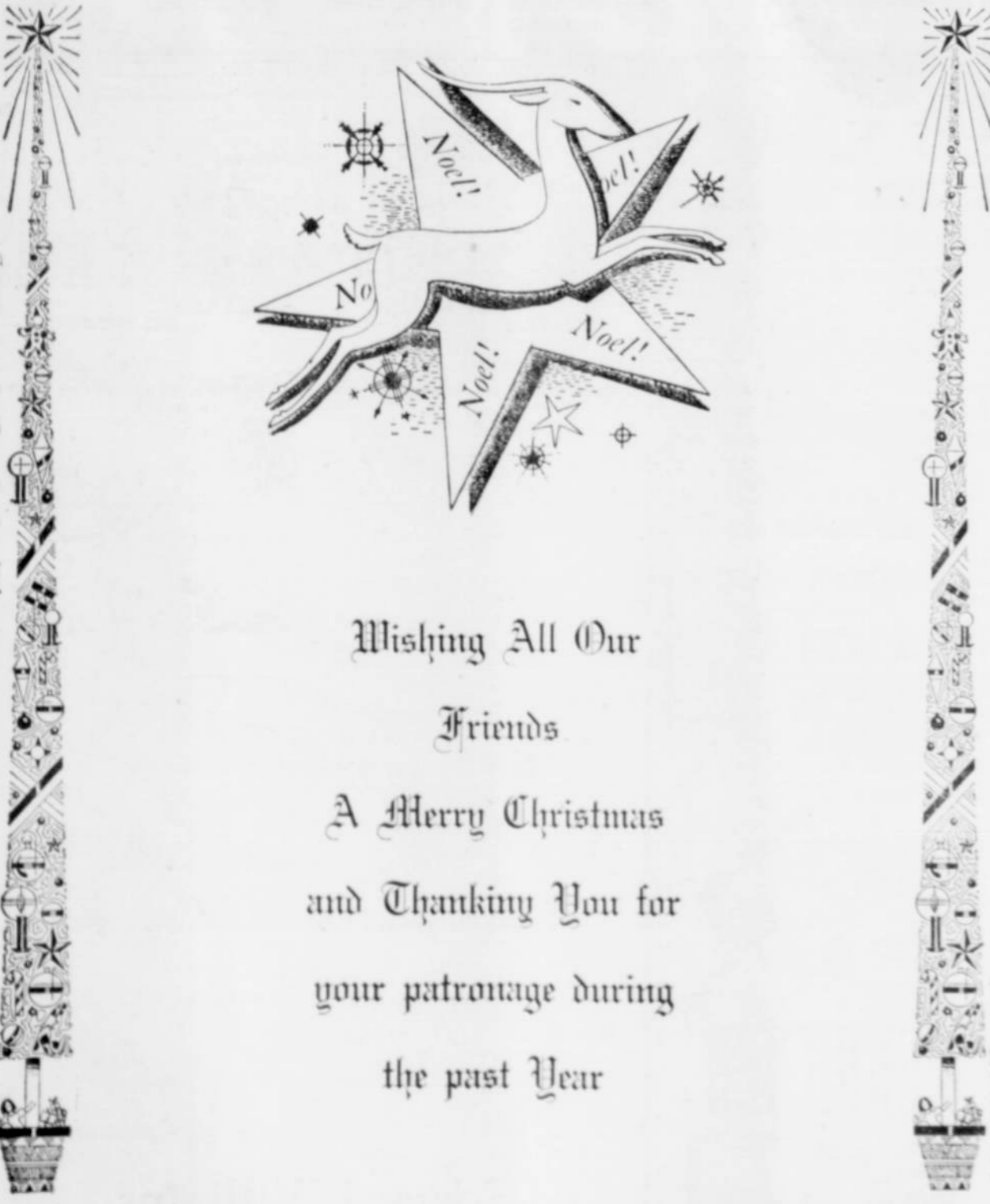
