## Modern Structure Honored Sunday By Church Folk

A more than capacity crowd attended the formal dedication of the modern new Community church located above Idanha, Sunday morning, although heavy snows and ice made travel difficult.

The ceremony was opened with community singing, led by Sol Workington, followed by scripture reading and prayer by the regular pastor, Eldon Haley, a student at the Eugene Bible School.

The Detroit high school girls glee club furnished several musical selections, which was followed by a solo by Mrs. Henry Quiring. A male quartet from the Mennonite Brethren Church of Dallas, then sang "God Is Here".

A historical sketch of the church organization in the community and construction of the present building was given by Mrs. A. R. Snyder. A mixed trio selection and quartet number by the Workington family was presented.

Minute greetings were extended by the West Salem Mennonite church, Warren Knappe of the Detroit Christian church, and Eldon Haley greeted the crowd.

Reverend Tewes of the Mennonite Brethren church in Dallas gave the dedicatory address. This is the first church to be located in the new city of Idanha.

## Phone Directors For New Year Named at Meet

Election of a new board of directors and amendment of the by-laws were carried out at the annual meeting of the Stayton Mutual Telephone company Tuesday, January 3, in Stayton.

Directors serving on the board will be elected to two year terms under present arrangements, as augmented over the previous by-laws. Two of the directors will be elected one year, while the other three the next, to members acquainted with the business of the directors.

Three members were elected to two year terms, while two members were given one year terms to inaugurate the new policy of the company under the amended by-laws. Elected for two year positions on the board were Irwin Parberry, president; George Schlies, vice president; and Ed. J. Bell, sec.-treasurer. Walter Frey and A. C. Van Nuys were named to one year positions under the new procedure.

The annual report of the company showed 36 new telephones were installed already this year, bringing the total served by Mutual Telephone to 357. Reports also indicated twenty of this number were "owned share" telephones; installed for persons purchasing telephone stock.

A notable rise in volume of service was noted by a 20 percent increase over the previous year.

Company assets for the past year totaled \$20,063.47, with \$5,116.76 of that held in cash and government bonds.

It was also brought out at the meet, telephone numbers in Stayton, Turner and Scio, with inclusion of letters in numbers, would be changed to four-digit numbers only. It was also stated in the report new numbers would be issued persons living in the area served by the Stayton Co-operative Switchboard association with arrival and installation of a new switchboard in that city.

## Leader Chosen For New Year Cancer Drive

Appointment of George W. Schoeffel, vice-president of the Standard Insurance company, as state chairman of the annual fund-raising campaign of the Oregon division, American Cancer society, has been announced.

The campaign is held annually during the month of April, which has been designated Cancer Control month by the United States congress. Schoeffel is well known in Oregon business and civic circles, having been active in various insurance organizations and charitable and civic groups.

He is a former president of the Life Managers association of Oregon and for many years treasurer of the Visiting Nurse association of Portland. He was president of the Portland Rose festival association in 1942.

In accepting the chairmanship, Schoeffel stated the "fight against cancer must be carried on to a successful conclusion."

"Since 1945 the greatest research attack ever launched on a single disease has been developed against cancer," he said, adding that "the American Cancer society is spearheading the growth of this great effort with the dollars contributed by the American Public."
