Miss Shiela Baltzer student at Willamette University in Salem spent the week end with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Art Baltzer.

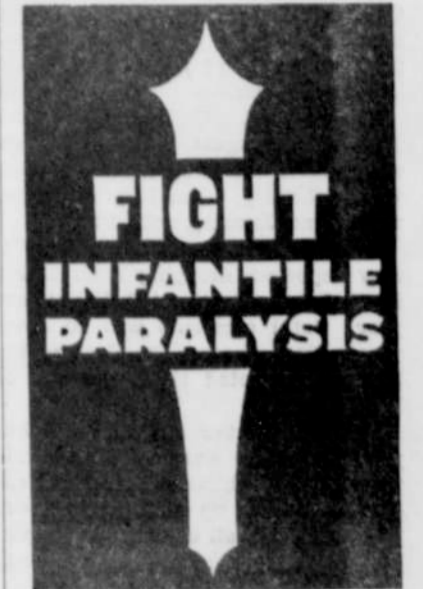

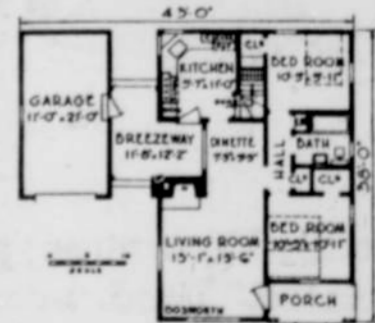
