## Elk Hunters Fail to Report

To date, less than half of the hunters who purchased elk tags in Oregon for last season have mailed in their hunting reports to the Game commission, it was announced today by C. A. Lockwood, Oregon State Game director. Lockwood pointed out that these reports are required by law and are also of vital necessity for the proper management of our big game herds.

Of the 16,980 elk hunters reporting so far, 7,257 have reported making kills, and 9,104 reported they were unsuccessful. The remaining 619 reported they did not hunt.

Lockwood stated that the late season in the Baker area running until December 31, probably had some bearing on the lack of reports, but he stated too that many deer hunters have also failed to report. He urged all deer and elk hunters who have not reported as yet to mail their reports at once.

If the return report card has been lost or mislaid, a letter will do. The letter should be addressed to the Oregon State Game commission in Portland and should include the following information: if a hunt was made or not, if a kill was made or not, and if a kill was made the approximate location of the kill and the approximate age of the kill.

This is one way that all hunters can help to maintain hunting in Oregon, Lockwood stressed.



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
