Little Known Rule Applies

Have you ever wondered at the audacity of the driver, who after waiting for some time at a side street while trying to enter a through highway, finally bulls his way into the traffic stream, perhaps escaping a collision by inches?

That driver may be taking a chance but at least the law is on his side. And according to the state traffic safety division, it is a law that few drivers know and fewer obey. Many who are familiar with the law have acquired their knowledge through a damage suit or traffic fine, the division said.

This is the way the law works. A vehicle stopping as required at the entrance to an arterial highway must yield to all vehicles within the intersection or approaching so closely as to be an immediate hazard. After having yielded to these vehicles, he may then enter the highway, and all vehicles approaching on the through must yield to him.

Confusion arises over the fact that vehicles often continue to approach rapidly on the through highway and may constitute a continuous hazard. According to the law, however, only those close enough to be a hazard at the time the other vehicle stopped have the right-of-way. The problem is one which could best be solved through common courtesy behind the wheel, safety officials pointed out.
