**Oregon Mother For '50 to be Selected**

A state-wide program for the choice of the "1950 Oregon Mother" was launched this week at a meeting of the Governor's state committee for the selection of the mother to be honored this week.

The activity is carried on each year as a part of the nationwide program of the Golden Rule Foundation of New York City, which asks the governor of each state to appoint a committee to choose a woman from the names submitted in the state and in turn submit her name and qualifications to the national committee.

The Oregon committee, appointed by Governor McKay consists of the heads of more than 20 state-wide organizations of women. Mrs. William B. Chandlee, president of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, Hillsboro, is chairman.

The choice of the "Oregon Mother 1950" will be made by April 1 and the Golden Rule Foundation will announce the "American Mother 1950" by May 1.

The choice of "Oregon Mother" for 1950 will be based on the following requirements:

First:—She must be a successful mother, as evidenced by the character achievements and maturity of her individual children.

Second:—She must embody those traits most highly regarded in mothers; courage, cheerfulness, spiritual and moral strength, patience, affection, kindness, understanding, homemaking.

Third:—She must have a sense of social and world relationships; and must have been active for her own community betterment or in some other service for public benefit.

Fourth:—She should be equipped by nature to make friends readily and to meet people easily in connection with her duties as The American Mother.

The Oregon committee has announced that nomination blanks may be obtained from Harriet P. Krause, editor of the Voice of American Women, 220 Southwest Alder Street, Portland 4, Oregon, and must be submitted by March 15th.

**Hrdina, Linn GOP Head**

Lebanon, March 7—Joe Hrdina, Albany realtor, was elected president of the Linn County Republican club at Monday night's organizational meeting in Lebanon, and March 20th was set for the next meeting of the group in Sweet Home.

The club voted to avoid affiliation with the state republican club until a study of advantages and disadvantages of such a move could be weighed. Lebanon Attorney Frank Mayer was named to investigate the question.

A request for \$200 from the central committee was okayed by the group, and Max Landon of Sweet Home was named chairman of a registration committee to consider means of getting potential voters out to the polls.

Ralph Mason of Albany was elected treasurer and Mrs. Justin Miller of Albany was elected secretary. Vice presidents elected were: Joe McHenry, Lebanon, mortician; Ken Grove, Sweet Home druggist; Dick Davis, Lebanon lumberman; Carl Farmer, Scio banker; and Catherine Bain, Albany realtor.

Bess Scharffenberg of Albany was named precinct captain co-ordinator, and Mason Buck, Lebanon reporter, was appointed public relations chairman. The registration committee of Landon includes Frank Mayer, Albany mayor, Jess Savage, Al Trimble and Glenn Holmes of Albany.

Rep. Warren Gill, Lebanon, candidate for state senator from Linn county, was introduced to the group as one of five republican candidates who will be running for office this year. Others were: Angus Gibson of Junction City, candidate for the joint Linn-Lane county senator; Mel-

vin Goode of Albany, present district attorney for Linn county, who has announced intention of running for state representative; Courtney Johns, current deputy district attorney from Albany, and Merle Long of Albany, both to run for district attorney.

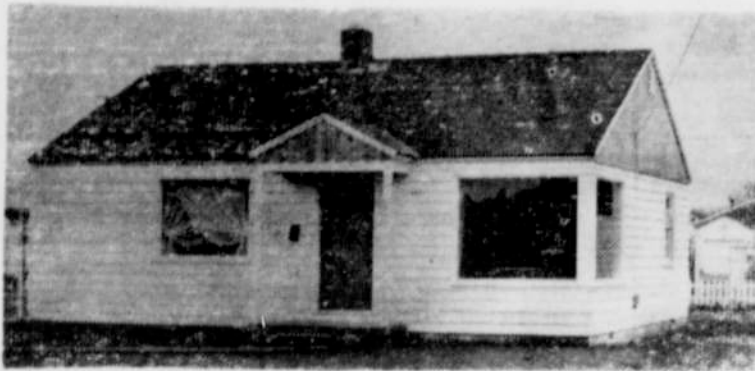

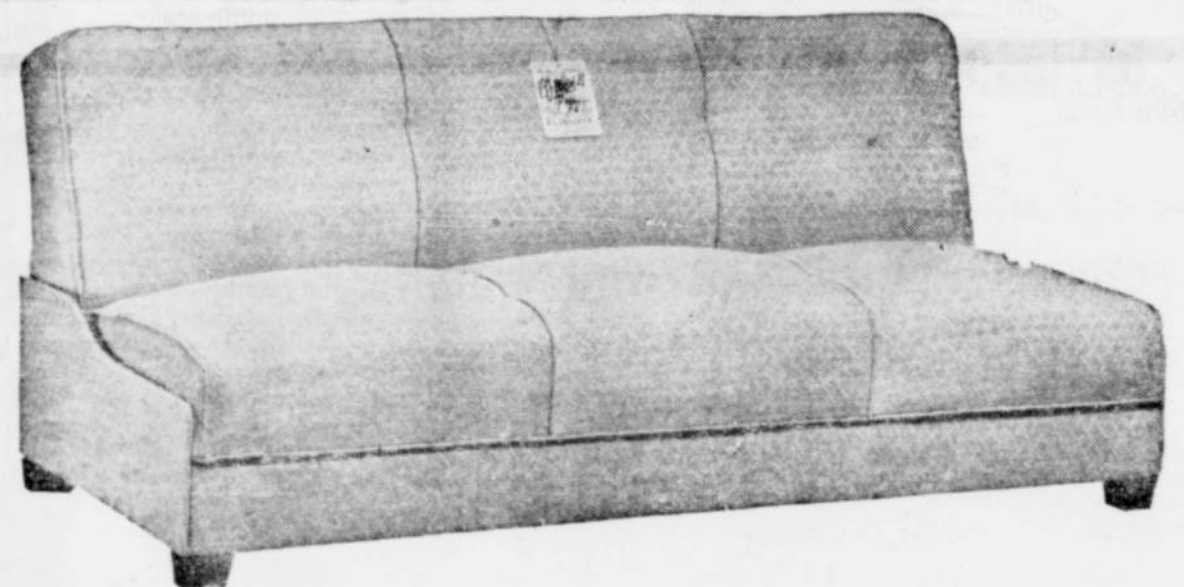
