(Continued from Page 1) — though lumber consumption dropped off nationally in 1949, the Douglas fir region reported gains in sales and shipments.

"Marion county's prosperity," Gossard said, "depends on whether local mills can maintain full production and full employment. We have had ample demonstration, during the last three years, of sales possibilities when we get out and really promote West Coast lumber."

"Every sawmill and every employee in western Oregon profits from the association's merchandising program," Gossard stated. "It is to the interest of all local millmen to join with their time and money to make certain this remarkably successful national lumber promotion program does not lag for want of full industry support."

Gossard said any mill operator in this region not participating in the national promotion effort, who desired to help, should contact association headquarters in Portland.

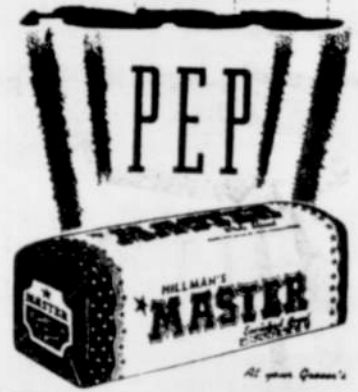
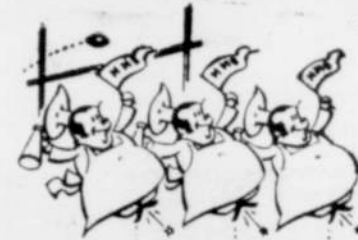
In addition to national advertising, Gossard said the association has supplied more than 1,100,000 pieces of literature on lumber use on request to every state in the union during 1949. They responded to another call early this week when a stove apparently exploded but nothing was set on fire.

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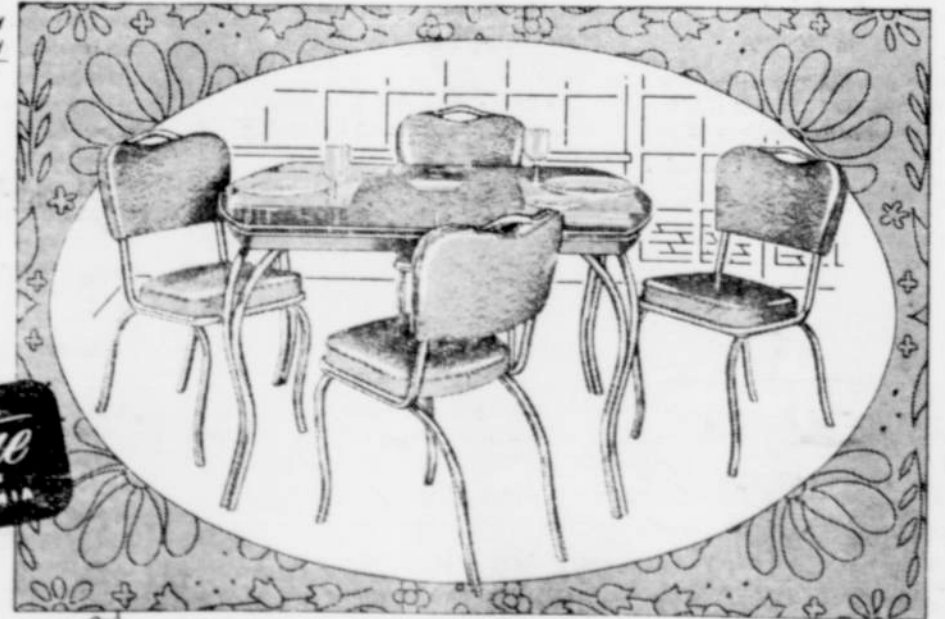


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
