The material, shaved from the rice tree, is imported from Formosa and will not mildew or mold. True flower scent will be added at a future date. Orders however, can be placed now for corsages, hat trimmings or flowers for any decorative purpose.

Several others in the Mehama area have turned a side interest into a source of income. Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Peck manufacture agate jewelry in a home workshop. Their equipment consists of a diamond saw, grinding stones and a polishing buff, operated by a gasoline engine.

They make a yearly trip to Eastern and Southern Oregon where most of their agates are found. A few of exceptionally high quality however come from Montana. Sets for brooches, necklaces and rings are sawed, polished and hand mounted

demanding many hours of exacting work.

Another ardent hobbyist who supplements the family income is Mrs. Louie Ray, the walking crocheter. With a ball of thread in her pocket and a needle always handy she crochets any time her hands are idle. Doilies, chair sets, pot holders, edgings, any one, might be the product of an afternoon walk. 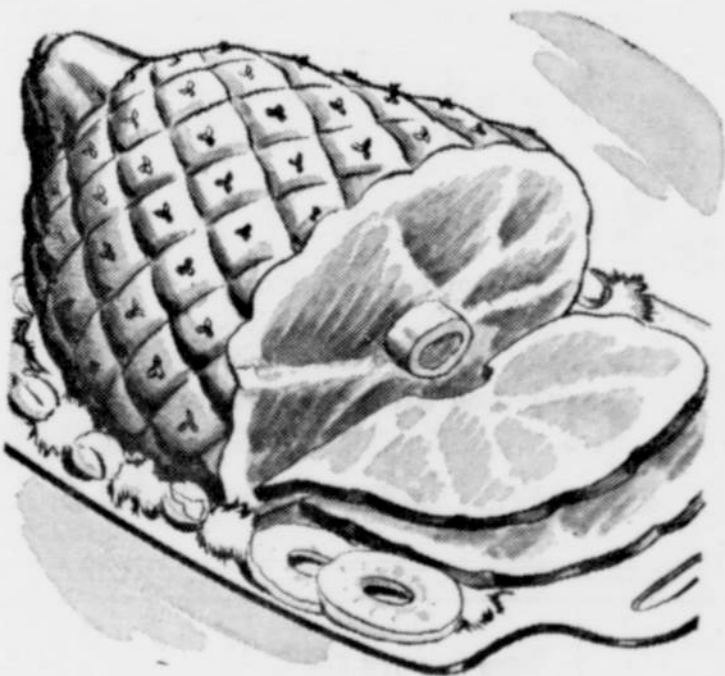

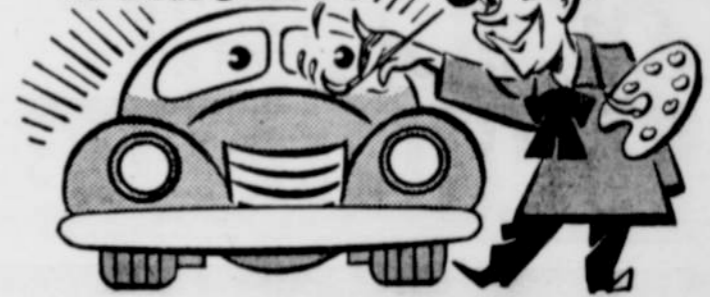
