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Airline 'Mailorder' Available

And now—a major airline is going into the "mail order" business to make shopping for air transportation as easy as buying a dress, a dishpan, or a theatre ticket by mail.

In a widespread effort to bring air travel closer to people not conveniently located near airline ticket offices, United Air Lines has established procedures for the speedy handling of mail requests for information, tickets and reservations. Purchases may be made by money order, personal or cashier's check sent to the airline's offices in this area at Portland, Salem, The Dalles, Eugene, Medford, Klamath Falls and Bend, as well as to other offices on its 10,700-mile system. Persons so requesting will be placed on a mailing list for monthly schedules—the airline equivalent of a mail order catalogue.

According to B. B. Gragg, director of sales, "the plan is particularly important to smaller cities and rural communities that have no other way of obtaining information or purchasing tickets, but it also should be welcome to suburban communities and in large cities where millions of people do much of their business by mail."
