LOS ANGELES—A key ring that travelled 12,000 miles after it was lost with a valuable ring attached alongside a Disabled American Veterans Identio-Tag is returned by Floyd L. Ming (right) DAV State Department Commander of California to Joseph V. Sedwell of Los Angeles. DAV tag, miniature license plate distributed annually to 30,000,000 motorists, which provides key loss insurance, was responsible for return of keys lost by Sedwell, found by Air Force pilot who later lost them in Germany and sent to United States by German woman. DAV national headquarters in Cincinnati returns approximately 5,000 keys in a month. Funds realized from tags make possible free service for disabled veterans and their dependents.
