Outstanding at the program was the banquet address by Police Chief John D. Holstrom of Berkeley, Calif. Holstrom is nationally known for his work in criminology and traffic safety. Other speakers included Governor Douglas McKay and Judge James T. Brand.

Claiming special interest during the conference was the panel discussion on fugitives and their methods of operation. The panel members consisted of officers from Seattle, California and Idaho as well as men from the Oregon departments and the F.B.I.

The convention closed with a tour of the Oregon State Penitentiary and a pistol shoot. The design of the convention gave promise of making more efficient police officers for every community in the state.

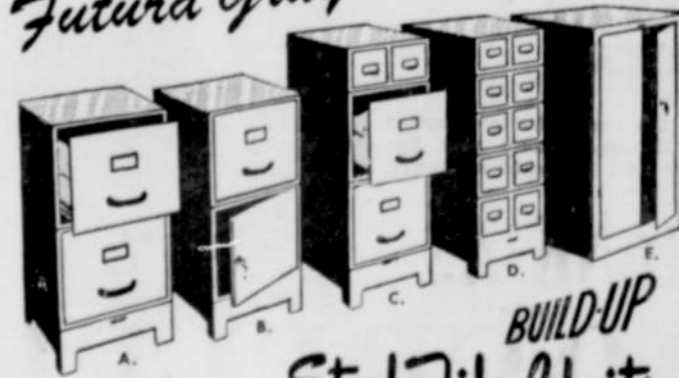
