## Santiam Riders Receive Invitation to Rodeo

The Santiam Riders and various Salem riding clubs have been invited to attend the 3rd annual St. Paul rodeo buckaroo breakfast and trail ride on Sunday, June 4, as a preliminary feature to the town's July 1 to 4 wild west show.

It is emphasized that participation in this day-long equestrian get-together is not limited to members of riding clubs, although many Willamette Valley groups have indicated that they will have delegations on hand.

Any horseback hobbyist is invited to take part in the activities which begin with the family-style breakfast at St. Paul city hall between 8:30 and 10 a.m. The cost of the breakfast is the only charge for the day's entertainment.

Four rodeo queen candidates will lead the horseback parade through several miles of picturesque trails in the St. Paul area, to a half-way point on the trail ride where the group will be served a free lunch. During the rest and refreshment hour, one of the princesses will be chosen queen of the coming 15th annual St. Paul rodeo.

Upon their return the ride, equestrians may watch or vie for prizes in a series of games, stunts, and contests at rodeo park. An award will be given the club with the largest delegation present, and other prizes will go to individuals and club teams winning the arena events.

Leo Poole then drove a long double to right-center to drive in all three runs. Muise then popped up to end the inning.

However, it did not take long for the Cougars to find the range as they scored seven times in the third and six more times in the fourth frame. The Timberwolves got their last run in the seventh inning without a hit. Hoffman again walked, stole second, and came home when Lawrence Thornley was safe on an error.

Again errors played a big part in the defeat of the "Wolves as they made eight miscues in the third inning alone. Mill City was limited to three hits, the two in the third and Shelton's single in the sixth.
