**From Other Editors:**

When Mrs. Ruth F. Stovall wrote to The Enterprise last week and inquired of Senatorial candidate Dave Hoover the best answer as to who he is, who is behind him and where he comes from appeared in the editorial column of The Capital Press in Salem. Their descriptive editorial follows:

**DIRTY POLITICS**

Lying comes easy for Dave Hoover, aspirant for Wayne L. Morse's seat in the U. S. senate. Lying also comes easy for Hoover's political hatchet men. So does political filth. In an ad last week Hoover accused Eugene Labor Press, and a Portland school director, of having "time and again" denounced Morse as "a commie sympathizer and political racketeer."

Hoover said these denunciations had been made in the presence of Joe Battaglia, and Heine Detloff at Hilaire's restaurant in Portland.

Scarcely had the scurrilous ad hit the press of the state before Allen issued a statement calling Hoover a liar.

Said Allen: "A candidate who maliciously and falsely, and with slanders him is utterly unfit for office. 'And so that lie is nailed.'

Battaglia, a Portland insurance man, and formerly a member of the executive committee of the Multnomah Republican County Central Committee, joined Allen in denouncing the ad as a lie.

So did Detloff, a prominent labor leader, and a republican party worker. The lie as Allen said had been nailed.

Simultaneously C. C. Crow, editor of Crow's Pacific Coast Lumber Digest, a propaganda sheet for the timber barons, visiously attacked Senator Morse editorially.

Crow accused the late President Roosevelt of "planting the seed of Communism" in the U. S., adding "it was only natural that he and his red colleagues should discover a kindred soul in Wayne Morse."

He had reference to Roosevelt's appointment of Morse to the War Labor Board. . . .

While vilifying Morse, Hoover's hatchet men are significantly silent as to Hoover's political past in Los Angeles.

They are significantly silent about Hoover having served as secretary to chief jailer, Clem Peoples, who was ousted, because of favors showered on Bugey Siegel, notorious gangland chieftain, slain a few years ago.

Dr. Ben Blank, jail physician, who admitted receiving \$32,000 in checks from Siegel was ousted in the same house cleaning.

Before the house cleaning Hoover had been promoted to a prowl car. He was in fine company. . . . They are also significantly silent about Hoover's party registration in California.

He was not the "real republican" in those halcyon days that he now professes to be in his senatorial campaign.

Incidentally people are beginning to ask where all the money is coming from to pay for Hoover's far flung bill board, radio, and newspaper advertising campaign.

Morse has no such slush fund. It is whispered that some of the

money is coming from the timber barons, who have exploited the people's timber resources, and now have an eye on their forest reserves. It is whispered also that some of the money is coming from the medical monopoly which is exploiting sick, suffering humanity. It is whispered further that some of the money is coming from the National Manufacturers' Association, whose wealthy members have been raking in millions through exorbitant prices from the people. Be that as it may it is hardly reasonable to presume that Hoover saved the money from his salary as a deputy sheriff.

But why pursue this sordid Hoover campaign further. He is foredoomed to defeat. Even Crow, who exudes venom from every pore whenever Morse's name is mentioned, admits the Hoover candidacy is doomed. And it is—make no mistake about that. The republicans of Oregon are not going to nominate a carpet bagger ex-deputy sheriff, without a single qualification, to replace United States Senator Morse, who has served his country and state with fidelity, ability, distinction, and honor.
