be citizens who have the best interests of the community and schools at heart. The PTA may serve as an interpreter of education, carrying information about the objectives of education and methods employed to gain those objectives. As such, we have a very important place in the community.

In many localities citizen's committees, as you have suggested, have been appointed, with all groups represented, to discuss matters concerning the schools. In that way controversial issues are settled with every side being shown. The PTA might set up such a committee and thus follow the national policy in solving problems on a community-wide basis.

I hope this advice will be of some help to you, and if not, Mrs. Moorhead will be back in Oregon by the first of June, and I trust you will refer the matter to her again.
