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Loopholes in Painting Methods

DON'T



...drag your well-dipped paint brush across the edge of the paint can to remove excess paint. That's a procedure which is very wearing on the bristles, even with the new consumer paint brushes bristled with nylon. In addition, if you drag the narrow ends of the brush against the edge of the can, you scrape off a greater percentage of paint than you want to—which means a thin coat and more trips back and forth for dipping.

DO



...tap off excess paint from a brush dipped only half the length of its bristles, against the side of the can opposite you. This practical suggestion not only retains a goodly share of the paint in the brush, but saves needless wear and tear on those bristles. Whether they be in the new nylon bristled paint brushes, or the older type hog bristle, they won't last long if constantly dragged across the edge of the paint can.

DON'T



...ride your paint brush. A heavy forcing stroke does not distribute paint properly and ruins your brush. Don't poke or jab a large brush into the corners. Use the brush designed for the job!

DO



...grip the brush on the metal ferrule, the handle between the thumb and forefinger. Use a long, steady, even stroke, lifting the brush gradually at the end of the stroke to feather out the edge.

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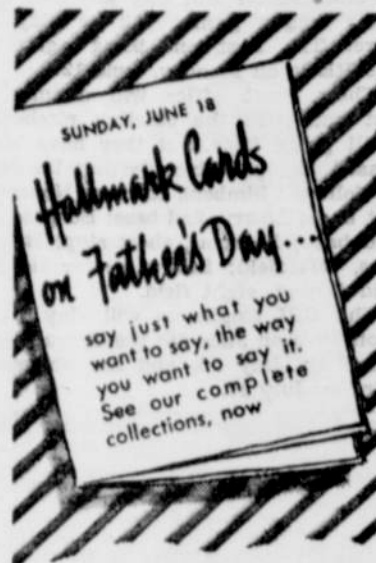
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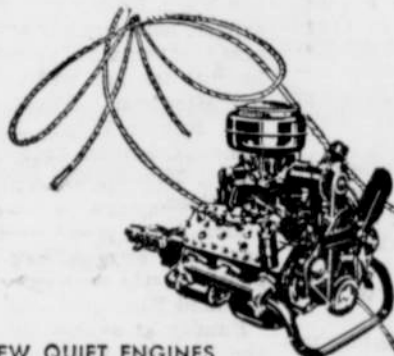
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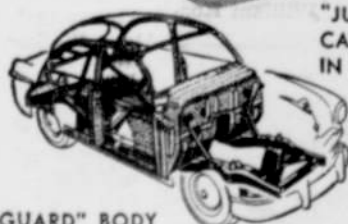
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
