Mr. Walter Reynolds attended his church convention in Salem the past weekend. Both Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds were present the week before.

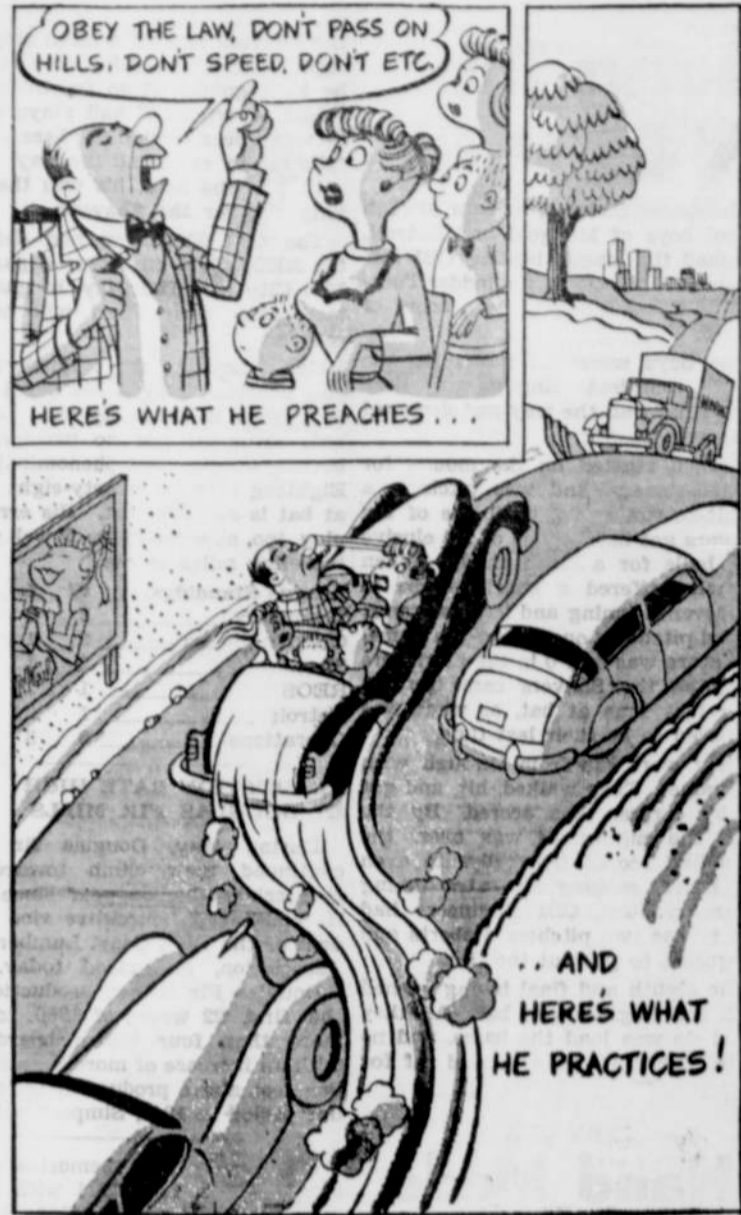
Chester Storey has purchased the Eli Bangs house and plans to move it from the CCC camp to a lot on the Vickers housing area.
