where an electric garbage disposer and stack them comes in handy) ext to the right hand bowl. Fill the right bowl with hot sudsy water. Place a rubber covered dishdrainer on the left hand bowl. Glassware should be washed first, followed by

silverware, plates and cups. Use Rinse Spray As the dishes are washed, trans-fer them to the draining basket which will hold all the dishes used by an average sized family at a meal. Use the rinse spray to thor-oughly douse the dishes with steaming hot water, washing away the suds and residue. You can leave the dishes to drain and air dry or they can easily be polished with a

towel. Stack dry dishes to left of the bowl. Presto! the job is done. At "company time" when there are more dishes than usual, it is suggested that glasses and silverware be washed, rinsed, and im-mediately dried. In the meantime plates are placed in the washing bowl to be soaked. Then get on with the job and it's done quicker and easier than you can imagine.


