

No Polio Increase Despite Weather

The recent onset of warmer weather brought no increase in Oregon's polio incidence, and the state board of health commented that "so far, this year's pattern is reasonably encouraging".

Those were the highlights of a report made to the Oregon office of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis today by Doctor Samuel Osgood, state health board epidemiologist.

Dr. Osgood said that the state's infantile paralysis rate is slackening after getting off to a somewhat faster start than was noted in the corresponding months of 1949. Thirty-seven cases had been recorded in 1950 up to the beginning of this week, as compared with 33 cases for the same number of weeks in 1949.

The medical man said that the only "unusual number of cases" this year had been reported in Clackamas County where an earlier onslaught of the disease inflicted seven persons. He added, however, that the Clackamas situation seemed to have improved materially in recent weeks.

The Clackamas County cases apparently resulted from a new outbreak as distinguished from most of Lane County's eight cases for the year which, Dr. Osgood said, were left-overs from the epidemic the latter county experienced in 1949. Latest figures showed that the last complication on a national scale gave a weekly total of 103 cases, in comparison with 168 for the corresponding week last year. National Foundation offices in Portland said that the county-wide incidence is running about one-third under the rate for the first five months of 1949, which was America's most severe polio year.

Nearly 43,000 cases were recorded in the nation for 1949—325 of them in Oregon which underwent its fourth worst year from the polio standpoint. Chapter officials throughout the state are stressing to parents the need for avoiding fatigue, polluted water, and large public gatherings, as precautions against their children contracting infantile paralysis.

Bonneville Calls for Bids On Transmission Line

The Bonneville Power Administration called for bids last Friday on invitation No. 5219 for construction of the Maupin-Detroit section of the Goldendale-Detroit-Goshen 230 kv transmission line.

Bids are scheduled to be opened in Portland July 10. This section of transmission line will be approximately 17 miles in length and will consist of 87 single-circuit heavy-steel section towers. The conductor to be installed on the transmission line will be 1,272 MCM ACSR conductor. This conductor has an approximate outside diameter of 1.4 inches. The invitation provides that the work under the contract will be completed within 460 calendar days after notice to proceed.


