Lead at Stake in Grudge Ball Game Set for Tonight

With first place in the Detroit Dam softball league at stake, the CBI engineers face the Teamsters tonight in Mill City.

The Teamsters had an unbeaten record up to Monday night when the REOS knocked them over 7 to 5. Their star hurler, Nel LaVine has chalked up the only shutout in the circuit this season. He will probably face the CBI engineers star hurler, Ed Yarnell, who has been mowing down enemy batsmen with regularity. He was on the sidelines when the Engineers lost their only game.

All in all tonight's game should be the top contest of the current softball season with all the elements of a top athletic contest wrapped up in the fray—competition, league leadership and a good old grudge.
