CHICAGO MARKET REFLECTS RISING LUMBER PRICES

Lumber and lumber product dealer to contractor prices continued to advance generally in Chicago during June for the fourth consecutive month, says a current Department of Labor bulletin.

No. 1 common Douglas fir two-by-fours increased 5 percent to \$126.60 per 1,000 board feet. Douglas fir interior plywood panel, sound one side, increased 4 percent to \$192.25 per 1,000 square feet. Two panel Douglas fir doors increased 4 percent.
