Maple Nut Sundae Sauce

4 tablespoons butter 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 1/2 cup chopped nut meats 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup maple-blended syrup

Melt butter in small saucepan. Add nuts and saute over low heat until nuts are lightly browned. Add cornstarch and salt and blend. Add syrup and cook over low heat 2 to 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve warm on ice cream or pudding. Makes 1 1/2 cups sauce.

changes at the place as time permits, and plan to continue operation of the rental apartments.

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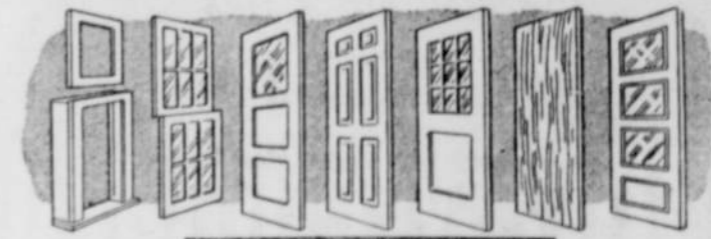
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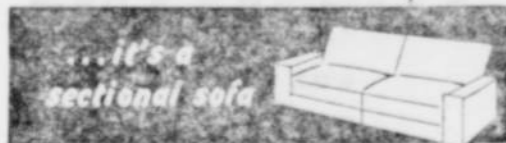
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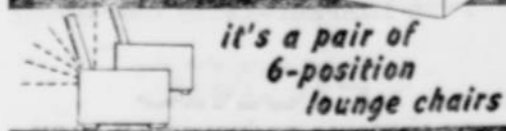
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
