Dick Shultz did manage a spectacular ride on the "strawberry roan," and the mysterious "mush-a-roon" kid from Salem did fairly well, but the power horses from the rugged Eastern Oregon range had those who dared buffaloes and those who dared were few and far between.

Jim King, organizer of the show, managed to ride the "Atomic Bomb," a ten-year-old bucking horse never tamed for something like seven seconds in which the horse revolved like a top in midair.

"First horse that tore me off in a long time," Jim commented.

But the youngsters did well enough to delight the good-sized crowd. Larry Nydigger took the boys, saddle races, and a seven-year-old girl from Aumsville, Betty Woods, trimmed the other tots at calf riding.

In all there were four hours of wild western fun for the folks. Jim King wishes to thank the Mill City fire department and the ambulance service for being present in event of emergency.

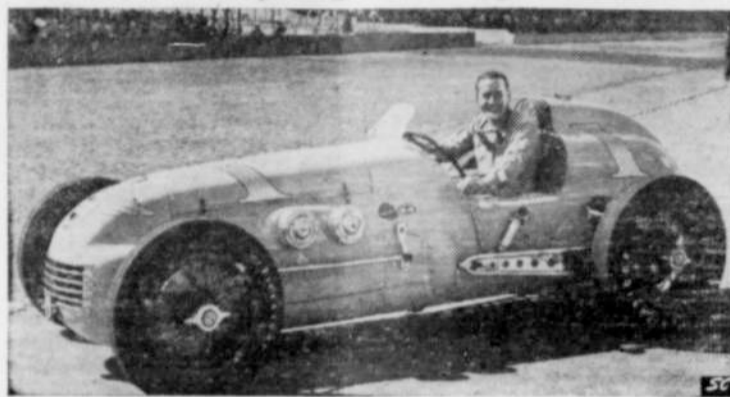

INDIANAPOLIS, IND.—Johnny Parsons of Van Nuys, Cal., who shattered a half-dozen track records in setting a new world's speed mark at the Indianapolis Speedway, says, "It isn't speed alone that causes so many tragedies on the nation's highways. It's carelessness."

"Care is my motto. Good care for your car, inside and out. Plus driving care."

Parsons, who is now racing at tracks throughout the country, was never a "hot rod" driver. He knows a car is even more dangerous than a gun when mishandled. He also believes a car should be given the same attention as a thoroughbred horse, "if you want a thoroughbred performance from it."

Deadline Approaches For Antelope Hunters

Oregon antelope hunters have until 5 p.m. tomorrow to make application for antelope tags and have them submitted to the state game commission.

The commission announces a drawing will be made among applicants with 1,500 to get the tags. Up to early last week, 2,920 had applied.

Successful applicants will be notified and asked to submit the \$5 antelope tag fee. Antelope season will be limited to the week of August 19 to 25, both dates inclusive. The designated open area includes all of Deschutes county south of the Bend-Burns highway and east of the Dalles-California highway, all of Lake county exclusive of the area bounded on the west by the Three Flags highway and on the east by the Warner valley road, and all of Harney and Malheur counties south of the Bend-Burns highway.
