HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

How would you like to cut down your kitchen mileage? If yours is a kitchen in which storage space and work surface is scattered all over the room, you know that the amount of traveling you do each day adds up to a lot of distance—and tired feet and an aching back.

The Youngstown Kitchen Planning Service contends that one can eliminate much walking just by an efficient arrangement of kitchen equipment. They suggest you start right at the kitchen sink.

The sink, they say, is the most important piece of equipment in the kitchen. It is the source of water, the place where many foods are prepared and where the cleanup is done after cooking and after meals. In fact, research has shown that nearly two-thirds of the homemaker's kitchen work is concentrated in the sink area.

Sink In Center

So, kitchen experts say that first you should have a cabinet sink that provides not only bowls, drainboards and water supply, but a great deal of convenient storage space in the cabinet beneath. Then, they place base cabinet units on either side of the sink and wall storage cabinets above the floor units. Tops of the floor cabinets give you the necessary work surface, and the storage space allows you to keep the often-used dishes, pots and pans, and food supplies within easy reach.

Wherever it is practical, the kitchen designers would place the range and refrigerator on opposite sides of the sink area. With continuous counter surface between the units, work flows easily from unit to unit, eliminating much of the homemaker's kitchen mileage.

General Rules for Freezing Foods:

1. Select foods of GOOD QUALITY to put into your locker.
2. Handle quickly. Do not delay more than necessary from garden to locker.
3. Scald all vegetables to preserve texture, flavor and color.
4. Cool all food thoroughly before packaging.
5. Protect foods by moisture-vapor-proof wrapping or packaging. Be sure to wrap meats tightly to exclude as much air as possible, so that they will not dry out and lose flavor.
6. Pack foods for freezing in units sufficient for a single meal. Thawed foods should generally not be refrozen.
7. Leave space for expansion in liquid packed foods.
8. Label all packages with contents, date, your name and locker number.
9. Freeze rapidly. Take advantage of "SHARP FREEZE" FACILITIES OF YOUR LOCKER PLANT. Quick freezing preserves the quality of your food and assures you of more tender eating later on.
10. Store properly packaged and prepared foods at 0 degree F. for a time no longer than recommended for the particular food. Rotate the food supply.
11. After removing foods from the locker, keep in the freezing compartment of your refrigerator until ready to thaw or use.
