Out of the Woods

Forester's Dream . . .
A record home building year for the U.S.A. is making a forester's dream come true in the big timber country of the Pacific northwest. "More lumber!" is the cry from millions, and the demand has no end in sight. It has grown steadily since the war, and the production of lumber in the nation's northwest corner has increased by one-fourth this year over the average for the years 1945-1949. All the while the theme song of the foresters has been, "Forestry has become a blue-chip investment." Now in 1950 most forest owners and loggers in the Douglas fir country, largest single source of American lumber, agree.
The Douglas fir region has only 26 million of the nation's 461 million acres of commercial forest land. But the warm, wet winters and cool summers are prime for tree growing. The Douglas fir species, in ripe old age, will stand up to 175,000 board feet on a single acre, or 17 average homes to an acre—a rare acre, I hasten to add. It reaches, also rarely, heights of three hundred feet and diameters of from 6 to 14 feet. The wood resists weather. Dead trees stand for many years before decay will go far into the tree.
Day's Work in Forestry . . .
Best of all for forestry, the Douglas fir is a great family tree—given a chance. It will fetch up seedlings "thick as the hair on a dog's back," as the loggers say. When fire is kept out, a new Douglas fir crop will begin to yield sawtimber in 50 years, and Christmas trees, piling and poles much earlier.
It costs real money to grow a 50-year crop, particularly when one faces each summer the deadly danger of forest fire, which may start from a flipped match or cigarette or a carelessly left campfire. But now the lumber is yielding enough money to pay for forestry and land with young trees on it is salable. So foresters are being hired by the hundreds.
How does forestry in the big timber work? First, in clean-sweep logging, except for the trees left to seed the cutovers. At the start, the loggers go into the timber with light machines to take out hemlock pulpwood trees, cedar poles and windfalls. Then the main logging job is done to avoid breakage and with as few leftovers as possible. "Re-logging" follows, to pick up timber that was too small for the big machines. A clean harvest is the objective. It can be done because the markets are so good. Never forget that forestry is an act on the land and cost real money.
Where the Money Comes From . . .
In the regular course of big-timber harvesting the foresters work with the bulls of the woods. All snags are felled, to reduce fire hazards. Light logging machinery is employed to avoid breakage of timber and to glean the cutovers. To protect the new crops, fire lookout towers dot the Douglas fir region, roads for fire-fighters web the forest country, and federal, state and industry forestry forces work in unity.
To repeat, a record home building year has increased production of lumber in the Douglas fir region by one-fourth over the cut of recent years. Records are being broken. Foresters do not see such giant production as an alarming drain on the timber resource of the region. The booming market is steadily increasing the values of reforested land, it is providing the money to pay for forestry, and reforestation is the order of the day for all the people of the Pacific northwest. In fact, "Keep America Green!" is in 1950 the slogan of all forest industries in the nation, this in the organized "Keep Green" movements of 27 states.
