

Tested recipes included peach creams, golden apricot balls, candied fresh mint leaves, nut and date creams, filbert chocolate taffy, chery divinity and stuffed, sliced prunes, peaches, figs and apricots.


Hostesses will find that fresh mint leaves glazed in egg whites and sugar will provide a refreshing accompaniment to iced summer punch. Dried fruit candies can be served as company confections or as a dessert after a family meal, Miss Kolshorn reports.

Peach or Apricot Creamy Candy 1/2 cup diced dried peaches or

- apricots. 1 cup water. 2 cups sugar. 1 cup milk.
  - dash salt.
  - 1 tablespoon butter.

1/2 cup finely chopped filberts or walnuts.

In a small kettle, cook diced dried fruit in water until fruit is soft and water is absorbed. In a larger kettle, cook sugar and milk to soft boil stage (236 degrees F.) stirring occasionally to prevent burning. Add dried fruit and cook until soft boil stage is reached again. Add butter, salt and nuts. Cool. Beat until it is less sticky and somewhat creamy. Turn onto waxed paper covered with powdered sugar or finely chopped nuts. Shape into balls or into rolls about 3/4 inches in diameter. Let rolls set before slicing.
