Betty Lou Cree spent several days in Salem with her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Gorton.

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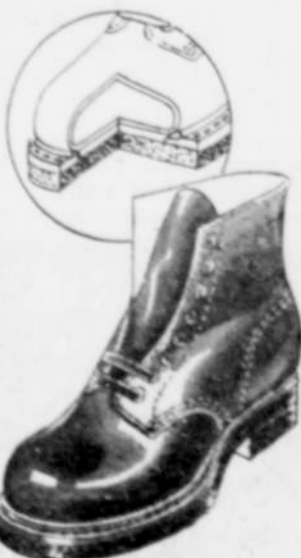
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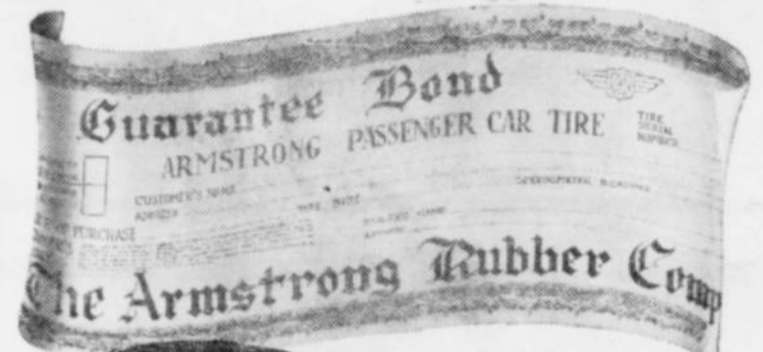
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
