

Hiway Safety Needs Increase Daily

School children, estimated at 100,000 strong, are now riding Oregon school buses in all sections of the state, reminded the Secretary of State's Traffic Safety Division.

By the end of school next spring, aggregate school bus travel will reach ten million miles.

The safety of the young passengers, the division points out, depends in large measure on how well other drivers observe the necessary caution when encountering a school bus. Oregon law requires all vehicles to come to a complete stop when approaching or overtaking a school bus stopped to load or unload passengers. The law further states that vehicles may not proceed "if and so long as any children are leaving the bus or crossing the roadway."

Violations of this law brought 250 arrests by state police during the 1949-50 school year, the division said.
