## Dam Cableways **Breaks Repair** Completed Wed.

Russell Hoffman, Detroit dam CBI engineer in charge of operations, reported this week that two broken gear shafts delivering power to the two cableways used in concrete pouring work were replaced and service restored Wednesday afternoon.

Engineer Hoffman explained that the manufacturer's standards on the cableway shafts were not equal to the job requirements; and that CBI re-placed them by using shafts double the original standard.
