

## Dam Cableways Breaks Repair Completed Wed.

Russell Hoffman, Detroit dam CBI engineer in charge of operations, reported this week that two broken gear shafts delivering power to the two cableways used in concrete pouring work were replaced and service restored Wednesday afternoon.

Engineer Hoffman explained that the manufacturer's standards on the cableway shafts were not equal to the job requirements; and that CBI replaced them by using shafts double the original standard.

Some 36 hours after the first shaft one of the cableways broke, its twin on the other cableway gave way, bringing concrete pouring operations to a halt via the cableway set-up. Concrete pouring, however, continued at a reduced rate by slower methods.

Mr. Hoffman indicated that the disabled cableways caused only slight disruption in operations with no wholesale employee lay-offs, even for short periods of time. No one was injured by falling machinery as a result of the severing of the two power shafts.

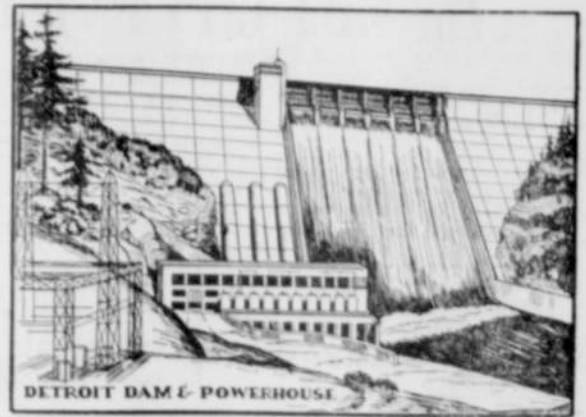

## Demos 'Haunt' GOP Friday In Salem Fete

Marion County Democrats whoop it up in a combination dinner-rally-dance tomorrow evening, Oct. 13th in Salem, Mrs. P. W. Hale, publicity chairman for the Marion County Democratic Central committee announced this week.

The "Haunt-the-Republicans - Day" begins with a juicy steak dinner at 6 p.m. in the Cave Room of the Senator hotel in Salem, where Herbert Maw, ex-governor of the state of Utah, will conduct a confidential discussion with some 200 party workers on the election strategy of party leaders for Oregon as developed by the Democratic National committee.

## New Hunter's Choice Deer Season Outlined

C. A. Lockwood, state game director, stated that some misunderstanding seems to exist in regard to the new hunter's choice season. This season is not to be confused with the general deer season.

The hunter's choice deer season will be held on October 21 and 22 only and will be held only on certain areas described in the hunting regulations. This season is open to those who have failed to fill their deer tags during the regular season.

All hunters are requested to mail in their return cards promptly and if they participate in the hunter's choice season they are requested to state whether the deer they took was a buck or a doe.

Elk season opens October 25 and closes November 19. The general pheasant season opens October 14.

All hunters who hunt on private land are reminded to first obtain permission from the landowners. Tell the little woman what general area you expect to hunt.

There, on United Nations day, October 24, the scrolls will be featured at the dedication of the giant Freedom Bell, which will on that day ring out for the first time the plea of millions and millions of Americans for peace and freedom for all mankind.

Where enrollment has not been completed, Scrolls will be forwarded to Berlin as received, for permanent enshrinement in the Freedom Bell tower.

## North Santiam Canyon Citizens Plan a Hospital

### Hospital Plan Outlined At Chamber of Commerce Meeting in Stayton

A plan to proceed at once with the revised program for the financing of a community-owned, controlled and operated non-profit and non-sectarian 25-bed hospital, to serve the citizens of the Santiam Valley and Canyon area, was announced Monday night at the meeting of the members of the Stayton Chamber of Commerce.

M. Van Driesche, president of the chamber, announced that after many weeks of planning and study a revised plan to finance a community-owned and controlled hospital had been made and agreed upon by the representa-

tive committees of the citizens of Mill City and other centers throughout the Santiam Valley and Canyon area. A large organization of farmers and those engaged in industry have been consulted as sponsors and have unanimously endorsed the new plan.

By common agreement of the planning and organizing committee, the new hospital will serve the citizens in the following areas: Idanha, Detroit, Gates, Mill City, Lyons, Mehama, Stayton, Sublimity, Shaw, Aumsville, West Stayton, Turner, Marion, Scio, and Jordan. To obtain hospital protection for this large section, the Santiam Memorial Hospital has been formed by a representative committee of sponsors.

The incorporation papers were filed at Salem, Oregon, on October 11, 1950. The following committee acted as incorporators for the sponsors: Walter H. Bell, Wm. H. Burrell, A. J. Frank, J. C. Kimmel, Roy Philippi, Gene Teague and L. H. Wright.

The Santiam Memorial Hospital will own the land, hospital building and equipment; it will also control the management and all business affairs of the hospital through a board of directors and its officers. The board of directors will employ a manager or superintendent, the same as is done in thousands of hospitals in the country. The board of directors will be twenty-one in number and elected by members of the hospital association for terms of three years each; they will serve without compensation.

During a short intensive campaign, funds will be raised through memorial plaques and memberships for the construction and equipment of the hospital. Each person or organization that donates \$100 or more will have one vote in the annual election of directors, also in all matters of vital interest to the hospital. Anyone who subscribes less than \$100 will be known as an Associate member, who has the privilege of attending all meetings of the hospital but cannot vote. An Associate member may at any time pay the balance due on a \$100 membership and become a voting member. A voting member cannot sell or transfer its right to vote nor give a proxy to another to vote in his place and stead. These provisions prevent any person or group from gaining control of the property or management of the hospital. The life of the hospital corporation is perpetual; its doors will never close.

There will be no assessments or annual membership dues, and no liability for the debts of the corporation.

The central office for the preparation of the money-raising campaign has been located in the Chevrolet garage on 3rd street, Stayton. It will be known as the central or area office. Another office will be established at a later date at Mill City, which will be the center of the campaign organization for the Mill City and Canyon area.

A special appeal is made, by the organizing committee, to all men living in the area to be served by the hospital to volunteer to serve as sponsors in the forthcoming campaign to raise funds for the Santiam Memorial Hospital. The sponsors will serve as workers in the campaign and will meet each day for breakfast or lunch for the purpose of receiving instructions and giving reports. This appeal for volunteers is made in order that no person may feel that he is ignored in this great community-wide humanitarian movement.
