Good Pheasant Take Predicted This Year

Good in eastern Oregon and fair in the Willamette valley is the prediction of the Oregon state game commission for the 1950 pheasant season opening at noon October 14.

To supplement natural production state game farms at Hermiston, Ontario, and Corvallis produced over 70,000 Chinese and Mongolian pheasants. Most of these birds were released in July and August. Some hens will be held for release before the breeding season next spring.

The 1950 game-farm pheasant crop was produced entirely under open-field conditions. Thousands of day-old chicks were sent from the game farms to field rearing projects at Enterprise, Madras, Roseburg, Summer Lake, and Camp Adair.

Wild pheasant hens outstrip man's best efforts at pheasant production. In pheasant arithmetic, ten hens plus one cock equal 100 chicks each spring. For this reason, hens are rigidly protected.

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HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

Among the interesting things about kitchen planning are the devices the planners use to determine how a sink, cabinets and other appliances will fit into the space available for them.

While it's not difficult to measure a kitchen and then draw a rough floor plan on paper it is not very satisfactory from the home-maker's point of view. She would like to know what her new kitchen actually will look like.

Tools Are Fascinating

So the kitchen experts have devised a couple of tools that make the job easier, quicker and much more fascinating. One of these is a special measuring rule that measures a kitchen in terms of sink and cabinets as well as in feet and inches. With this device he can tell at a glance what units will fit into the room.

Then the planner goes to work with another still more fascinating device. It is called a Min-A-Kitchen and consists of miniature, built-to-scale plastic models of standard prefabricated steel kitchen units, a range, refrigerator and even lithographed doors and a window. Also included is a scaled floor and sidewalls.

Like Magic

Having the correct measurements, the planner sets the walls to simulate the real kitchen and then puts the miniature sink, cabinets and appliances into place. Like magic the new kitchen grows right before the home-maker's eyes. She can visualize without stretching her imagination the greater convenience and beauty that her new kitchen will bring.
