Out of the Woods

Four New Forest States . . .

Our more than 8 million acres of junior forest land in the Douglas fir region are acres that were once cut over or burned over but were seeded by nature and are now bearing crops of trees thick and thriving enough to be classified as timber growth in the U. S. Forest Survey.

The trees of the junior forest are just standing there on the land, growing. Most of them won't be usable for from ten to forty years to come, except for Christmas trees and poles perhaps. We still think of forest values in the old way; that is in terms of virgin timber, big trees. We carelessly cause thousands of fires in the junior forest, and when it burns we too often say, "Only brush fires; just fern fires; why get excited?"

Foresters would like to see Paul and Babe come back and move our 8 million acres of junior forest lands to the Atlantic seaboard, among a population that would cherish and protect the growing trees more than our own home folks do.

The present states of Connecticut, Rhode Island, New Jersey and Delaware all together do not run to many more acres of land than we have in crops of Douglas fir and hemlock trees of less than saw timber size. In addition we have enough acreage of second-growth saw timber to make a fifth state half the size of Massachusetts, or three new Rhode Islands.

Paul and Babe could do the trick, just as they made Iowa what it is today.

In his time Iowa was the Big Hole of the Midwest—a hole so tremendous that it swallowed, even in flood season, all the water the Mississippi and Missouri rivers poured into it. When Paul started logging up north he found he couldn't raft his logs anywhere unless the two big rivers were made to run on south. So he scouted all over, looking for land to fill up the Big Hole. The only good prospect he met was in California.

The Californians had a piece of land called Iowa which was the size of the Big Hole, and they put little value on it. The only crops they cared about were oranges and tourists. The big piece of land would only grow corn to feed hogs. Even Los Angeles didn't want to annex it. Paul Bunyan could have it and welcome.

So he hitched Babe, who could pull anything with two ends to it, to a county at a time, and by next spring he had Iowa all set in its new place in the Big Hole of the Midwest in time to start the year's corn crop.

Indian Trouble . . .

All hands concerned were happy about the deal, except the Big Hole Indians. They started a lawsuit against Paul Bunyan, and they followed him with it wherever he logged.

In fact, that was how the tribe got its new name, which it still bears—the Sioux Indians. The spelling is Old Indian Style for words of the kind. "We'll sioux you," was how the Big Hole chief first served written warning on Paul Bunyan. When Paul quit the country, the tribe started "siouxing" the government, and has been at it ever since.

The California country where Paul and Babe hauled off the good earth of Iowa is now the Death Valley region. "The old Californy blood is still strong in Ioway folks," the loggers say, "which is why so many of 'em go there to live out their last days. But Californy people themselves still don't set much store on the land that yet fills the Big Hole—the land of Ioway State."

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Small businessmen are reporting signs of a business slump. While mounting prices are a contributing factor there is a greater primary cause.

"We are being jaw-boned into a depression," observers say. They point to the great number of bureaucrats, from cabinet rank on down, who miss no opportunity to cry "Wolf."

An example of this is the statement by Commerce Secretary Sawyer that heavier taxes, serious shortages, and business controls can be expected for many years to come.

Observers say Sawyer may or may not be a competent Commerce Secretary. But all agree he is ill-equipped to assume the role of a prophet; even less qualified in international relations.

It is pointed out that bureaucrats were almost openly scornful when Gen. MacArthur in July said the turn in Korea had been reached.

Yet, MacArthur with inspired American fighting men scored a success. But since the end of World War II in 1945 no single bureau plan for the promotion of peace has succeeded.

According to all reports, there is now a concerted drive to keep war scares and rumors flying so that the people will not get curious about domestic affairs.

Responsible military men are saying nothing. Some did explain how peace could be secured; were immediately cracked down on by bureaucracy.

The facts are that socialistic planners have been uncurbed too

long. That's the reason for the present inflation.

Now there's only two alternatives. One is to honestly admit what has happened. The other is to further socialize private enterprise.

Washington observers don't look for honesty. They see, instead, the drive under way to further socialize America being pushed.

The plan is "Scare them to death, and a frightened people will sign away their freedom."

In the meantime, bureaucratic spending of taxes takes weird forms. Now, it develops Marshall Plan funds are being used to play traffic cop to the world.

ECA Bulletin #6 reports that Marshall Plan funds have been used to build a traffic inspection station in Athens so Athenian police can check vehicle registration, license plates, brakes and lights.

Use of American tax dollars for such purposes could create a storm that would topple over entire bureaus.

So public attention is kept focused on a constant series of alarms. Loud mouthed bureaucrats fail to realize they are shattering public morale; slowing down the American economy.

And this fact may cause the eventual disappointment of Socialist planners.

For when, and if, they take over the goose that laid the golden eggs—independent American enterprise—they may find the goose died from fright.
