Willamette U Semester Plan

Willamette university has been singled out by the American University of Washington, D.C. as a member institution in the Washington semester plan, according to word released today by Dr. G. Herbert Smith, president of the university.

In naming Willamette to the plan, the local university becomes the only school west of the Missouri to participate in the program. Only 11 other selected colleges and universities, in the east and middle west, are currently included in the program.

Under the plan, two to four qualified majors in the social sciences go to Washington, D.C. in the second semester of their junior year to study a full semester in the nation's capital while enrolled in their own institution and receiving academic credit as if they were carrying the same courses on their respective campuses.

Plans are underway for two or more outstanding science majors at Willamette to initiate the Washington semester plan in February, 1951.

Study falls under four major headings: (1) an individual study project worked out in connection with some one of the government officials; (2) a seminar on American Government in Action in which government officials will appear as the speakers; (3) courses in the School of Social Sciences and Public Affairs of the American university, done mostly in the evenings so that the full day could be devoted to the individual project; and (4) special events including social invitations to some of the embassies, invitations to professional societies, trips to points of historical interest.

Other schools included in the American university plan are Allegheny, Dickinson, Westminster in Pennsylvania; Hiram, Oberlin, Denison and Wooster in Ohio; Birmingham-Southern in Alabama; Hamline in Minnesota; Lindenwood in Missouri; and Transylvania in Kentucky.

Once every few years, each of the member schools, including Willamette, will send a faculty member to Washington to teach students in the semester plan.

This is the second such honor accorded Willamette within the past nine months. In March, the university joined the Carnegie Tech in a combined plan, whereby a student may receive both a Bachelor of Arts degree from Willamette and the Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering and Science from Carnegie Tech.

Mrs. Kenneth Crosier, president of the Mill City PTA, this week brought into the Mill City Enterprise office the following article. The Mill City Enterprise—like Mrs. Crosier—believes the piece worthy of your perusal:

"The opening of school was editorialized in practically every newspaper in the United States, but no finer subject was chosen or better written than that of Roger Hill in the Laurel Advocate, headed 'Please, Don't Hurt My Little Boy'."

"Dear Driver. Today my son, who is five years old, started to school. He wore brown trousers and a little tan shirt. He had on brown and white saddle shoes and a little green jacket. His cocker spaniel, whose name is 'Hypo' sat on the doorstep and whined his belief in the folly of education as the boy waved 'Good-bye' and started off to the halls of learning."

"Tonight we talked about school. He told me about the girl who sits in front of him . . . the boy with blond curly hair . . . and the boy across the aisle who makes funny faces. He told me about the teacher . . . and about the trees in the school yard . . . and about the big girl who doesn't believe in Santa Claus. We talked about a lot of things; we colored, drew letters and then off to bed."

"He's in bed now . . . sound asleep with his little toy panda cuddled in his right arm. You guys wouldn't hurt him would you? You see, I'm his Daddy. When his wagon breaks or his finger is cut, or his head gets bumped, I can fix it . . . but when he starts to school, then he's in your hands."

"He's a fine little guy and I'm so proud of him. He runs like a deer and darts around like a chipmunk. He likes to play cowboy and go fishing with me. But I can't be with him all the time . . . I have to work to pay for his clothes and education. So please drive slowly past the schools and intersections . . . and please remember that children run from behind parked cars."
