HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

Homemakers who have modern cabinet sinks find that one of its greatest conveniences is the pull-out spray. Located handily by the faucet, it is attached to a long rubber hose that reaches to every part of the sink top.

The spray's primary use is to rinse the dishes after they are washed and stacked in a rubber covered basket either in a sink bowl or on the drain board. A generous spray of piping hot water can be directed into every groove and cranny of dishes, pots and pans, assuring thorough rinsing.

But the spray has other uses, too. The Youngstown Kitchens Planning Service suggests that it comes in mighty handy when cleaning vegetables. The strong spray of water removes dirt, sand, and other foreign matter from spinach, lettuce, radishes, carrots and potatoes, making the preparation of these vegetables quick and easy. It's an excellent device, too, with which to water flowers or potted plants. The full force of the spray should not be used, but a light spray will wash dust from the leaves and won't injure them.

(Incidentally, here's an interesting tip on the care of potted plants. When emptying ash trays, occasionally throw some of the ashes onto the dirt. Ashes help promote vigorous growth and long plant life.)

After the dishes are done, the rinse spray can be effectively used to clean out the sink bowl, washing food particles clinging to the sink into the crumb cup strainer or into the food waste disposer. If your sink is equipped with a spray, try all these uses to get the most out of this convenience.
