

Freedom or Slavery?

The grave military crisis in Korea and the threat of a third world war confront the people of this country with one of the most perilous situations in our history. Now, perhaps more than at any time in the past, the need is for steady nerves, for calmness of judgment and firmness of action and, above all, unity in our determination to preserve our national integrity and our way of life against any attack.

As this is written our soldiers, marines and airmen in Korea and the fighting men of other members of the United Nations are falling back before the overwhelming weight of the Chinese communist attack. This onslaught was launched treacherously and with reckless disregard of the consequences to China and the world at a moment when the United Nations forces had virtually completed their assigned task of restoring peace in Korea and re-uniting that unhappy country.

The military outcome in Korea is not yet clear, but our gallant men already have suffered severe reversals and heartbreaking losses. A wave of anger, tinged with apprehension for the future, has swept the country. But our actions now must not spring from motives of anger or fear.

Certainly we must refuse to listen now to the shrill voices of discontent and disunity which always arise in a time of national crisis. Those individuals who are seeking to sow distrust of our government and to divide us from our natural allies should feel the full weight of public condemnation. This is true whether the guilty individuals are in Congress or whether they use the medium of the press and radio to spread their divisive and false

The truth is that our country is more united now in the face of the world-wide threat of communist military aggression than it has ever been in any period of national crisis in the past.

. . . all of us are aware of the grave risk of general conflict which has been deliberately caused by the Chinese communist leaders.

"Their action greatly changes the immediate situation with which we are confronted. It does not change our fundamental purpose to work for the cause of a just and peaceful world.

"No matter how the immediate situation may develop, we must remember that the fighting in Korea is but one part of the tremendous struggle of our time - the struggle between freedom and communist

"This struggle engages all our national life, all our resources. For the effort of the evil forces of communism to reach out and dominate the world confronts our nation and our civilization with the greatest challenge in our history."

The President made plain that it would not be an easy task to reach and maintain the military strength we may need, and he also made it clear that in addition to strengthening our own defenses, we must continue to work with other free nations in the struggle against communism. He said:

We must remain firm in our commitment to the United Nations. That is the only way out of an endless circle of force and retaliation, violation and war-which will carry the human race back to the dark ages if it is not stopped.'

The President's claim statement affords us a strong anchor for our thinking in the days ahead when the chorus of those who seek to foment discontent and distrust and disunity may be expected to grow even noisier and more irresponsible.

These voices, whether they come from the Congress or from the press and radio, do not tell the truth about our nation.

President Truman and the responsible leaders in Congress, from both political parties, are meeting the threat that all recognize to our national survival and our free way of life with courage, firmness and calm determi-

The people of the United States can have confidence that the best brains of this nation are being applied, without any regard to partisanship, to the over-riding problem of safe-guarding our nation in a world

The meeting in Washington of President Truman and British Prime Minister Attlee, who represents the people not only of the United Kingdom, but of the entire British Commonwealth of Nations, has served to underscore the unity of the great community of English-speaking peoples in their determination to preserve and protect their common heritage of freedom.

The extra session of the 81st Congress, which assembled after the elections in an atmosphere of normal partisan controversy, has turned into a demonstration of national unity on essential questions of national

Our rearmament program is being pushed with all possible speed, and the necessary home front measures to support this defense effort and protect our national economy are moving ahead in Congress with bi-partisan support

These include heavy new appropriations for the armed forces, new taxes to help pay for these expenditures and to spread the burden equitably and prevent profiteering, extension of rent control, and establishment of a civilian defense organization.

On the administrative front, machinery is being perfected to channel scarce materials into essential defense industries, to curb prices when they get out of line and unreasonably high, and, if it becomes necessary, to institute general price and wage control in order to protect our people and our country from the dangers of inflation.

All of these measures are being taken by the government of a free people who not only welcome, but have demanded, positive action, despite any cost of personal deprivation and hardship and sacrifice, to meet the dangers which face our country.

In this situation the Congress and the President need continuous and outspoken support from all loyal Americans, regardless of party affiliation, for the steps which must be taken.
