New Year's Day Babies To Be Born With "Silver Spoon In Their Mouth"

It was the fabulous Don Quixote who said that "every man was not born with a silver spoon in his mouth." However, one American company is doing all it can to change that. The 1847 Rogers Bros. division of The International Silver Company, is offering free to every baby born on New Year's Day, 1951, not only a silver spoon but also a silver fork and a gay plastic plate in the shape of a duck. To twins, 1847 Rogers Bros. will give free to each a six-piece set of silverplate designed to fulfill all feeding needs up to the age of ten.

All the parents of children born January 1, 1951, have to do to receive the free kiddie's kit is to send their name and address, along with that of the attending physician and hospital to 1847 Rogers Bros., Meriden, Conn. Thus, a penny postcard can confound the "wisdom" of Miguel de Cervantes, the author of Don Quixote.

We have come a long way since the Spanish author put those famous words into Don Quixote's mouth. Up until a century ago only the very wealthy could command silver for their tables or put silver spoons in the mouths of their new-born babes. Most families ate their meals with utensils made of bone, wood, or pewter which were heavy and clumsy to use. The development of silverplating on a commercial basis in 1847 by the three Roger brothers—William, Asa, and Simeon—made it possible for the first time for most American families to own gracefully designed, skillfully made, and perfectly matched silverware.

For many of the families who will receive the free gift for their New Year's blessed event—or events—the new silverware will mean the fifth generation possessing 1847 Rogers Bros. silver. Last year, 2,547 babies received a free spoon.
