

Oregon 4-H Champs Go to Chicago









Delbert Sarkie TATE championship honors for 1950 have been won by four 4-H Club members for outstanding work in the National Canning, Clothing, Food Preparation and Garden programs. Their awards are all-expense trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, Nov.

Long range food preservation plans won for Eleanor Olsen, 17. Astoria, high honors in the Canning Achievement program. A 4-H'er for nine years, she has completed 40 projects, and can-ning has been her favorite. Because she learned how to select and preserve fruits, vegetables, poultry and meat produced on the farm, Eleanor has been able to reduce the family food bill considerably. Use of her 900 jars of ome-canned foods provided well balanced meals the year round. All vegetables canned are grown by Eleanor in her own garden. She has won many high awards on exhibits, including more than \$88 in prize money. For her fine record, Kerr Glass fg. Co., provided Eleanor's trip to Chicago.

It doesn't cost very much for Frances Hudziak, 18, 1123 S. E. Harney, Portland, to be smartly dressed because she is handy with a needle, and knows how to buy patterns and fabrics. As clothing winner, Frances has to her credit 767 garments made, mended or altered during six years in club work. She won many honors on her clothing exhibits including State Fair grand champion in sewing overall divisions. For three years she won the city-wide summer school scholarship. At the Denver National Wool Growers contest she was awarded first prize and a \$300 scholarship. Frances is the junior leader of her local club and president of the county 4-H organization. Her trip was made possible by Spool Cotton Co., program sponsor.

Delbert Sarkie, 17, of Astoria, not only grew prize-winning vegetables and fruits this season, but in the national 4-H Garden program. Delbert's trip award was given by Allis-Chalmers. The Astoria boy has won a trophy for having the best 4-H Garden project in his county five different times. He also won a war bond in a 1945 Victory Garden contest, and has been winner in a food production contest three times. Delbert has shown in 12 exhibits his scientific knowledge of plant care. As leader of his 4-H Garden Club two years, he's benefited others by his experience.

A highspot in 4-H Club work was reached by Genevieve Nelson, 18, of 4552 N. E. 19th Ave., Portland, when she was named state winner in the Food Preparation program. A 4-H'er for seven years Genevieve has completed 29 projects, specializing in cooking, canning, child care and clothing. She became expert in meal planning, and has cooked and served more than 170 meals. Surmounting difficulties which included riding to town on a bus and carrying the food and cooking utensils, she captured the dollar dinner championship. At a total cost of \$1.45 she prepared and served a 'company dinner for four". With the victory came a \$100 college scholarship which she hopes to use to study home economics at Oregon State College. Genevieve's club activities included serving as leader three successive years, vice-president of county, and president of state 4-H organizations. Her reward, a trip to Club Congress, was furnished by Nash-Kelvinator Corporation.
