HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

For many a homemaker the kitchen serves as much more than the room in which she prepares meals and does the clean-up job afterwards. Frequently it serves as her "office." Here she keeps the family's budget, writes checks to cover the household bills, copies and files recipes that look enticing—and helps the children with their homework. Sometimes the modern kitchen is criticized because it doesn't allow for such "extra curricular" chores. But there's no reason why modern steel kitchen equipment can't be arranged to provide the comfortable and efficient facilities for this part of the homemaker's work.

Take a look at the arrangement illustrated below and suggested by the Youngstown Kitchens Planning Service.



Here a standard base cabinet top is hung between two standard steel base cabinets at a level 30 to 31 inches above the floor. It is firmly supported on a wood strip secured to the wall and by bolts secured to the side panels of the cabinets.

This forms an ideal kitchen desk, with drawer space handy in the adjacent cabinets. The top is smooth, making an ideal writing surface, and is easily kept clean.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

This week before Christmas a new cynicism prevails in Washington.

The current remark: "No Santa Claus? Haven't you seen the present government at work?"

No one argues need for defense money. Crosses on graves in Korea overshadowing many American homes this Yuletide prove that.

So far, American "toughness" has been only getting tough with American small businessmen and consumers.

To many others the gay, feckless Santa Clauses of Washington have been very generous indeed.

For example, Santa Claus Stuart Symington, Chairman of the National Security Resources Board, just arranged a fine present for Jones and Laughlin, a powerful steel corporation. Because the corporation agreed to expand its production a special tax plan is approved for it.

No provision of similar nature is made for a small metal fabricating plant that needs a new shear.

And during the five years of peace, steel supply was so short that these fabricators often had to pay "gray market" prices for steel to keep operating.

Because of government restrictions on the use of copper and aluminum, many independent businessmen look into 1951 with misgivings.

Yet, the ECA announces Marshall Plan dollars have bought in Canada \$711,000 worth of aluminum for shipment to Austria and Sweden. In addition, \$2,621,000 Marshall Plan dollars bought

copper in Canada, Cuba, Chile and Bolivia for shipment to Germany, France and Italy.

It's also Merry Christmas in the Republic of Ireland, a country always neutral while Americans die.

Marshall Plan dollars, taken in a large part from the nation's 4,000,000 small business firms, have sent another \$453,000 worth of tobacco to Ireland.

In fact, on a recent day, an ECA press release deemed it outstanding news that no money was given away that day.

The official press release states "No new purchase approvals to Western Europe were announced today by the ECA." But to avoid any suspicion there is laxity in showering American tax dollars around, the report further states "The cumulative Marshall Plan figure now is \$10,421,594,000."

The American Santa Claus so aroused the emotions of youngsters in Udine, Italy, so the ECA reports, that they have sent as a gift of appreciation to the zoo in the Bronx and Chicago each one donkey.

Observers are wondering what symbolism was attached to sending Santa Claus Uncle Sam the gift of a donkey. There's room for speculation.

But American taxpayers will look in vain on Christmas morning for the big gift.

That would be a sweeping slash in non-essential spending of taxes to offset increased defense costs. Seemingly, politics must go on as usual, even though it was not possible for life to go on as usual for the thousands of brave Americans in Korea who will never again be present around the family Christmas tree.
