## A Day of Work in Logging Industry

A day of work in the logging industry at this time of year is uncertain, due to windy winter weather. Cold, rain or a few inches of snow seldom deter a timber worker, but any wind causes a woodsman to be uneasy.

A fire is built each day just before noon to provide heat for lunch hour. Workers usually take turns at this with a skill in fire building unexcelled by boy scouts.

Location of a pitchy snag is always known. A generous slab chopped off and a fire quickly ignited without paper or kindling. Ability to do this stems from the knowledge that pitch never gets wet. To an inexperienced eye the black pitch in a snag might look like water-soaked wood.

For a long-lasting fire that gives quick heat, without smoke, bark is used. A woodsman seldom gathers dry twigs or limbs, but uses his trusty axe to chop pieces of bark from standing trees. Gasoline or oil is sometimes near-by, and a pile of bark is quickly ignited in this way. The only complaint on bark is that it gets awfully hot and the workers must keep retreating.

In winter weather a fire is never extinguished. Occasionally an old snag is lighted that will burn for several days. One time the cutting crew above the old Kirsch mill built a fire in a stump during a snow storm. Two weeks later the weather had reversed and fire season was declared. The stump, now burning furiously was noted by the forest service and extinguished.
