Winter "Outing"

The North Wind and Jack Frost's antics need not cheat your youngster of her daily fresh air quota. It's possible to keep roses in cheeks and appetites high with indoor "outings."

On really bad days, merely dress the little one as though for outdoor play, then pull up her playpen beside an open protected window. If there's some sun, it's a plus value; if not, fresh air alone is still a health-giving factor.

It's important not to overdress the youngster, because after all, she is in a warmed room. It's also wise to protect her chin, cheeks and hands from chapping. A bit of baby lotion patted on face and hands will do the trick. This soothing emulsion of pure bland oil and water, with lanolin and an antiseptic added helps foil the roughening effect of outdoor weather.

The youngster will be content in the playpen longer if she has a few engrossing toys. And occasionally Mother should stop by to spend a few seconds with the youngster. This helps do away with the "parked" feeling an active child is likely to get from being put in any enclosure.
