Fort MacArthur, Calif.—Pvt. Dean S. Culp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Culp of Mill City, Ore., is one of 495 new army inductees now taking basic training at Fort MacArthur, with the 409th Engineer Special Brigade.

After six weeks of basic, Pvt. Culp will take advanced engineer training which will qualify him as a member of one of the most remarkable organizations in the armed forces.

The 409th Brigade, commanded by Brig. Gen. Henry K. Kellogg, is part of the nation's "Sea Going Army" and combines the functions of the Coast Guard, Navy, Seabees and Combat Army Engineer units.
