It was on that date, back in 1912, that Juliette Gordon Low organized the first Girl Scout troop in the United States and started the nationwide movement which has grown and grown until today membership is more than a million and a half. There are Scout groups in rural, urban, and suburban communities in every state and USA possession.

The achievements of Girl Scouting during the thirty-nine years of its activity have been remarkable. The movement has expanded its program as well as its membership during a period of the nation's history interrupted by two wars and a major economic depression.

Generations of girls have received Scouting's splendid training in citizenship and democracy. Today Girl Scouting has an enormous backlog of old friends; it has established itself as an important community and national service to youth attracting civic minded grown-ups just as it attracts girls.
