HAVE A BETTER KITCHEN

Let's assume you're one of the lucky homeowners with a new automatic dishwasher. You'll find it to be major labor-saving device, taking most of the work out of those three-times-a-day chores and washing the dishes more hygienically than you can by hand.

Besides that, you'll find that it will practically eliminate the use of drying towels and dishcloths, and there'll be less use for the traditional kitchen sponge. Moreover, with less need to put your hands in water, it will be easier to keep your hands and nails in good condition.

But it should be remembered that the dishwasher is a mechanical appliance. It requires intelligence and care in its use. Just as the dentist who sold you the machine gives you a thorough demonstration, so you will understand how the machine works.

Read the instruction book and follow it, especially as regards to the amount of detergent to be used. This may require some experimenting on your part, for how much you use depends largely upon the degree of water hardness. Extensively hard water frequently leaves water spots which are objectionable and annoying and can be removed easily by rinsing with a towel. Incidentally, not all detergents are suitable for the dishwasher. Use only detergents recommended by the dishwasher manufacturer.

Since one of the basic requirements for good dishwashing is plenty of hot water, the best dishwasher is equipped with a booster-heater tank to insure delivery of hot water. You can help by making sure that the normal household water supply is piping hot.

"SMALL BUSINESS"

The fight to give statehood to Alaska will be bitter. The affairs of Alaska on the surface seem to have little in common with national small business.

However, all retailers and newspaper publishers have a big stake in the outcome of the Alaskan statehood bill. The future of America's newspaper supplies depends on the publisher pays for newspaper.

Today flat newspaper is priced, F.O.B. mill, at \$100 per ton. In 1947 it was \$104, in 1948 \$111; in 1949 \$100.

Charles O. Nichols, National Retail Dry Goods Assn. president, has protested increased newspaper prices. Senator John Sparkman of the Small Business Committee and Emanuel Celler, House Judiciary Committee Chairman, want to open a Congressional investigation of this problem.

Newspaper, essential to news publication, is practically monopolized by four American companies. They, in turn, apparently have understandings or interlocking ownership, with Canadian newspaper companies.

Newspaper is made from pulpwood. Alaska has millions of acres of unused pulpwood forests.

For years independent bushmen have tried to establish a newspaper industry in the territory, only to be blocked by bureaucratic directives in Washington.

As one observed lately, "It's difficult to take a deep breath in Washington. You inhale and some monopoly rears its ugly head in the air which the monopoly breathes. It should mean you exhale and some bureaucrat exhalts the interference with his prerogative of issuing fat air."

While the Internal Revenue Dept. figures out new ways to get tax dollars, strange things happen.

For example, FCA Bulletin No. 182 states the Marshall Plan has given another \$300,000 worth of tobacco—to French South Africa.

And Washington bureaucrats are working out a rubber allocation plan.

But we ship rubber to Communist China—600 tons in September through the port of San Francisco, equal to the entire 1949 rubber exports to Red China.
