active North Santiam chamber belongs to all citizens and the civic, business, industrial, and agricultural leaders in this area; it is not wholly the problem of the sponsors and workers who have volunteered already their time and money in the cause of a North Santiam Chamber of Commerce.  
Glen V. Sorensen, president of the Mill City Chamber of Commerce commented, "Each of us should face the issues squarely and ask ourselves this vital question: What can I do to help make possible a North Santiam Chamber of Commerce and thus afford my fellow citizens and myself a better place in which to live? If we each face this as a canyon resource development problem, we are certain that there will be united effort to make possible the formation of an effective canyon-wide chamber of commerce that will make this area a very desirable place in which to live."
