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

Some idea of the magnitude of the work on Detroit Dam may be gained from this overall view of the main construction center where the concrete structure of the dam itself rises slowly from the bed of the North Santiam river. More than 25 percent of the concrete already has been poured - this despite the fact there appears no great alteration in the former domain of the nervous North Santiam river. Observers freely predict that never again will the North Santiam river rise up in anger and flood the Detroit Dam, now it must take the routes provided by the Consolidated Builders. Over 340,000 yards of concrete have been poured into forms designed in such a manner that sometime in 1953 an inspiring and monumental work will enhance the North Santiam Canyon. The saw-tooth shape of the roads shown illustrate the steepness of the mountainsides where soon a great dam will command attention. The Army Corps of Engineers have recorded on a film called "Operation Concrete" the actual construction work on Detroit Dam from its beginning until the pouring of the first bucket of "mud".
