



The new plan was announced last week by the President and Major General Lewis B. Hershey, Director of Selective Service. Student deferments will be based upon either capacity to learn as demonstrated by the results of a nation-wide test or upon scholastic performance as evidenced by class standing. These two criteria are variables which may be raised or lowered to either increase or diminish the number of students in training. as the national interest may require.
